Preaching Truth Today

In many conversations within Dominican circles these days, there is a great deal of distress expressed regarding a lack of civil discourse and what has come to be called a post-truth-

era. Once upon a time we used to simply call an untruth a lie. Now we have created the oxymoron of "alternative facts."

One might say that the scandalous name-calling and lies and are now worse than ever. But have you ever been to the Lincoln Museum in Springfield? Have you read about the vitriol hurled about by the presidential candidates in 1800? And recently I saw a poster with the words, "Honor the treaties," and I thought to myself, we've always played fast and loose with the truth in this country. Think about it. Our country is built on broken promises. I wonder how Colin Powell feels about "alternative facts?" We can all come up with examples.

The difference today is that, with the lightning fast speed of the media, it is in our faces immediately. The barrage is constant, and we are overwhelmed.

Veritas – our Dominican motto. Certainly that doesn't give us a corner on the truth. It does, however, call us to be truthful and to speak the truth – to preach the truth. So rather than languishing in the state of being overwhelmed, we share in the experience of the prophet Jeremiah who said, "then within me there is something like a burning fire shut up in my bones; I am weary with holding it in, and I cannot."
