One year from today, November 30, 2015, the world's leaders will gather in Paris for what may be the most significant climate summit to date – *Paris 2015*. Today, on November 30, 2014, the first Sunday of Advent, we hear in the Gospel, "Be on your guard, stay awake."

Our hope is that not only do we stay awake, but that we also awaken our national leaders to grasp the depth of the current climate crisis and the importance of taking the appropriate actions to insure a viable future for all of creation.



We can't help but note that the timing of *Paris 2015* is in such close proximity to the DSC Convocation in October 2015.

Over the course of the next year, you will receive a monthly reflection, making the connection between Global Climate Change and the critical issues of our time, eg. human trafficking, water, migration, poverty, etc. We trust this will help us collectively to understand, reflect and take appropriate actions regarding the vitally important issue of the climate crisis.

Our hope is to have sustained communication with our elected political leaders/legislators on the issue of Global Climate Change. We want to encourage them to make sure that the U.S. is in the forefront of setting the stage for greenhouse gas reduction and other appropriate actions. Recently following an historic agreement between the U.S. and China to reduce carbon emissions, President Obama stated:

The United States of America is stepping up to the plate. We recognize our role in creating this problem. We embrace our responsibility to combat it. We will do our part, and we will help developing nations do theirs.

This is the kind of leadership the world desperately needs, and what we as a conference hope to support over the next year through prayer and action. More information about communications to our elected leaders will follow in the months to come.
