The Executive Committee Endorsed A Statement written by John Gehring, the Catholic Program Director for Faith in Public Life (a strategy center for the faith community advancing faith in the public square as a powerful force for justice, compassion and the common good). The report is written specifically in regards to threats to the Campaign for Human Development, the U.S. Bishops' anti-poverty initiative. These threats come from well-funded critics who are opponents to the bishops' social justice campaign who create a culture of fear around faith-based community organizing. To quote John Gehring, "the groups use guilt-by-association...and are part of an increasingly aggressive movement of Catholic culture warriors who view themselves as fighting for a smaller, purer Church."

When we read the report, we felt that it was important to spend time with it as well as to discuss it among ourselves in regard to endorsing it as a group. At the conclusion of the discussion we decided, as the Dominican Sisters Conference Executive Committee, to endorse the statement. We discerned that it was important that we speak to the justice of the issue for the sake of the mission.

The five recommendations that signers endorsed were:

- Lay Catholics concerned about protecting the church's social justice witness in public life should redouble their commitment to the Catholic Campaign for Human Development through donations, letters of support to bishops and volunteering.
- The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops should consider convening a series of public dialogue sessions with a diverse range of anti-poverty experts, social justice advocates, theologians, philanthropists and community organizers with the goal of strengthening CCHD partnerships and finding common ground.
- Catholic bishops and diocesans staff should resist the influence of pressure groups like the American Life League that are hurting faith-based community organizing.
- While Catholic Church funds should never go to organizations that directly advocate for causes opposed to Catholic teaching, more prudent assessments are needed before CCHD cuts vital funds to effective organizations that empower low-income communities simply because of associations with other groups or coalitions.
- At a time when the working poor have fewer advocates and income inequality is rising, Catholicfunded organizations should not be isolated

The Executive Committee met by conference call on May 13, 2013. One of the first items on the agenda was a discussion of the results of the survey in which those who completed the survey spoke of the desire for collaboration and resulting action as a central goal of the conference. There is also a desire for a majority to speak as one voice especially against injustice. It is our hope that this can happen as a result of the planned regional/area meetings.

There was considerable discussion in regards to planning for this year's elections (one from leadership and one from membership at large) so members are being approached to become part of an Election Committee. Now we need good candidates!!!

The following is the role description for the Executive Committee:

- to conduct the general business of the DSC according to its mission, purpose, and role;
- to act for and on behalf of the DSC between meetings of the membership to engage elected leadership and members in the identification of goals and objectives of the DSC;
- to appoint and oversee the work of the Executive Director of the DSC;
- to approve, the agenda of the annual meetings; and
- to present the annual budget for approval by the elected leadership.

Currently the Executive Committee meets once every six weeks or so by conference call and twice a year in person. Expenses are covered by DSC.
