In Memoriam

Dominican Sister of Adrian Ann Rozalia Szabo, OP

On August 12, 1932, twin girls were born to Louis Szabo and Florence Murphy Szabo in Tucumcari, New Mexico. Elenora survived her twin Rozalia Ann, who died within hours of birth. She entered the Congregation in 1950 and at Reception Elenora requested the name Ann Rozalia, to honor her twin.



Ann ministered in elementary and music education for $36\frac{1}{2}$ years, and as pastoral minister for 10 years. She worked with native peoples in San Juan Pueblo, New Mexico. There, with the assistance of choir members, she composed a Mass in Tewa, the language of the people. That Mass was played prior to her Funeral Liturgy. An artist, as well, Ann painted the picture on her memorial card.

In New Mexico, she daily made pots of soup for the less fortunate who came to her table. She was a quiet, sensitive, talented woman who dearly loved "all creatures great and small" – human and animals, especially cats. On April 10, 2019 at the Dominican Life Center, Ann went to meet her God and her twin—at the age of 86 and in the 68th year of her religious profession. To view her obituary, please click here.

She was assigned to Cathedral Elementary School in Raleigh, NC, Sacred Heart School in Camden, NJ, Our Lady of Victory School in Mount Vernon, NY, Saint Joseph Elementary School in Toms River, NJ, Saint Boniface School in Paterson, NJ, Saint Mary School in Passaic, NJ, Saint Paul School, Jersey City, NJ, Saint Lawrence School, Lindenwold NJ, Assumption School, Emerson NJ, and Saint Mary School in Ocean, NJ. In 1989, Sister retired from school ministry and volunteered in the infirmary at Mount St. Mary Convent, Newburgh, New York and served in various capacities in the Congregation as a volunteer in the Development Office.

Dominican Sister of San Rafael M. Donna McPhee, OP

Sister Donna McPhee, a Dominican Sister of San Rafael for 67 years, died peacefully on April 7 at Our Lady of Lourdes Convent in San Rafael.
